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A New Year's Message for 2017

It is really hard to believe that another year has passed by and the New Year has already arrived. The officers of our chapter hope that you all had a very Merry Christmas and wish you a prosperous new year ahead. May peace and good health be with you throughout this year.

As our chapter begins its 51st year in the Antique Outboard Motor Club, Inc., I wanted to reach out to our current membership and ask for your help.

You all should be aware that anyone who is a member of the Texas Chapter must also be a member of the Antique Outboard Motor Club, Inc. The Texas Chapter is not a club, but is actually a subsidiary of AOMCI which is incorporated as a 501(c) organization in Florida. If your membership in AOMCI has expired, or is about to expire, I am asking that you please consider re-joining or renewing that membership as soon as possible. If our Texas Chapter includes individuals on our roster who are not members of AOMCI, we jeopardize our right to exist as a chapter of AOMCI, and could lose our charter as a result. If you need help getting your membership reinstated or renewed in the AOMCI, I would be very happy to assist you in any way that I can. Please feel free to contact me directly. My contact information is printed on the back of this newsletter.

With that said, another thing I have noticed is that the Texas Chapter is shrinking in size. At the turn of the century, our Texas Chapter membership rose to a high of 238 members. I still have a roster from 2000 that shows this number, and all individuals listed on that roster were also shown in the AOMCI roster. When I received my last Texas Chapter roster, membership is now only 97 members. We have lost several members over the past few years due to their deaths. Other members took on new interests and simply decided not to renew. This is not just a problem in the State of

Texas. The nationwide trend in AOMCI has also been one where the average age of a member is nearing retirement age and recruiting new younger members has become somewhat difficult. If the organization is to survive, we must attract new members, and we must retain existing members.

So, here is my New Year's challenge to all of you. Try to convince 2 people to join AOMCI this year. If half of us can convince 2 people to join and the other half convinces only 1 person to join, our Texas Chapter membership would increase to around 242 members which would be an all time high.

You may ask, "Where do I find these people?" That answer is much more simple than you may realize. We will be participating in the 2017 Houston International Boat, Sport & Travel show in NRG Center from January 6th through January 15th. If you volunteer to work at our exhibit, you can talk to the visitors. We will have applications available there. If you collect cash and hand them a receipt, I will use my PayPal account to sign them up with AOMCI and will use my personal checking account to send Chip the appropriate dues for the Texas Chapter.

If you are like me, you probably have friendly neighbors that look in your garages to check out your old toys. Sign them up like I did Jerry Ball last year. If people call you to discuss old motors, invite them to join like I did Royce Strickland last year. It is really not all that difficult.

AOMCI has resurrected the one-year membership as of the end of last year. A one-year membership in AOMCI is \$40 and the Texas Chapter is \$10. Collect \$50 for a one-year membership into AOMCI and its Texas Chapter. AOMCI membership for 2 years is still \$70 and Texas Chapter is \$20. Collect \$90 for a two-year membership into AOMCI and its Texas Chapter. This saves the new member \$10 if they pick the two-year option

over the one-year. We are definitely not the only people collecting old outboards in our 5 state region. Let's find some of those other antique outboard motor nuts and sign them up.

The primary sales pitch that I use is *The Antique Outboarder*. Where else can someone learn about older and antique outboard motors? This is where you can point out that our quarterly publication is "*The Pioneering Authority*" when it comes to old outboard motors. It is a well prepared and professionally edited magazine, and is not just some old photocopied pages thrown together haphazardly.

For the more computer savvy individuals, there are also a pair of valuable web sites available to all members of AOMCI and the Texas Chapter. A wealth of information appears on those sites and a great number of people are available to contact in order to discuss any particular restoration job. Please take a little time this year and try to help your club and chapter grow.

There is one last topic that I would like to address. At the end of this year, the Texas Chapter will once again be seeking nominations for chapter officers, as we do every two years. I have not discussed this topic with Adam; however, I know that by year-end Adam will have served as our President for 6 consecutive years and he has

done an outstanding job in my opinion. I do not know if he is planning to run again, but I will quickly point out that I will not seek the President's position should Adam decide not to accept nomination for another two-year term. I have served in that position at least 3 times since 1989 and I will not take that office again. If health allows at year end, I am open to another term as Vice President. Consideration should also be given to Chip Rathbun. Chip has served as our President for 2 years followed immediately by Secretary/Treasurer for the last 6 years. Like Adam, Chip has served as an officer for a long time and has also done a great job. I do not know if he is considering accepting nomination for another two-year term.

I only decided to bring this issue up so the members can be aware of the pending election at the end of this year. If someone is interested in taking a turn in one of the offices, please let any one the three of us know. This could be your opportunity to take a turn at running the Texas Chapter.

I believe that I have rambled on enough for now and will give it a rest. I look forward to seeing all of you at an event sometime this year. If you have not participated in a while, please come on out and have some fun with us. I do not think you will be disappointed.

In Memoriam by Tom Oncken

It is with deep regret and a heavy heart that I have to inform our Texas Chapter members of the passing of another of our more prominent members who regularly attended our Lake LBJ wet meets. Gus Gustafson passed away on September 8, 2016 at the youthful age of 92.

I did not know Gus well; however, it was not difficult to see that he had a serious need for speed based on the boats and motors that he ran at our meets. I read in his obituary that he was racing one of his boats at 70 miles per hour while in his 90's. I can assure you that I saw him scooting around in some powerful boats at our meets. 1924 - 2016

Gus was born in Meriden, CT on September 18, 1924. You may not have been aware that Gus attended Mercersburg Academy and joined the Navy during WWII. He served from 1943 to 1952 as a fighter pilot. After his hitch in the Navy, he graduated from the University of Alabama with a Bachelor of Science in Aeronautical Engineering and a Masters in Engineering. He put his degrees to work when he became employed by Chance Vought (later known as LTV Aerospace) in 1951 assigned to missiles and spacecraft. He retired from LTV in 1985 as the Deputy Director of the Anti-Satellite Program which was a successful missile program designed to "intercept and destroy" orbiting satellites. A few years later, he was recognized as a Distinguished Engineering Alumni at the University of Alabama for his good work.

Gus was an avid sailor, hunter, skier and enjoyed racing outboard motor boats. Family time



was incredibly important to Gus. He was active in the Boy Scouts of America where his three sons earned the title of Eagle Scout.










