It Was The Best Of Times, It Was The Worst Of Times.

I hope that my newsletter fans will forgive me for borrowing a line from Charles Dickens' classic novel, "A Tale of Two Cities", but it seems to be an appropriate description of the events of the last quarter of 2018.

"It was the best of times." We eagerly awaited our much anticipated fall wet meet at the Heart of Texas Lake Resort on the weekend of October 19th through October 21st. As the last wet meet of 2018, we looked forward to the fun and camaraderie that this annual event continues to provide to our members who make the effort to attend.

"It was the worst of times." On the Tuesday before our scheduled meet, television news networks showed a massive flood which was occurring on the Llano River not more than a few hundred yards from our old meet site at the Longhorn Resort. The flooding was so intense that we watched films of the bridge that connects Highway 71 to Kingsland. Texas breaking into pieces and tumbling down the Llano River. The film crews were taking their photos from the building that was built on the old Longhorn Resort site after it was bulldozed. Obviously, we cancelled the meet since the LCRA declared all rivers and lakes in the area to be closed immediately due to the massive debris from the flood.

"It was the best of times." The Texas Chapter was completing its preparations for the 25th annual swap meet being held by Louis Rothermel at his shop in Houston. Written invitations were sent out in anticipation for a landmark Texas Chapter swap meet.

"It was the worst of times." Louis Rothermel received a telephone call on the day before

his swap meet from Carleton Callahan who informed Louis that one of our long-time members and race legends, Albert Snell, had just passed away earlier that day. Louis decided to honor Albert by renaming the 2018 meet as the Albert K. Snell Memorial Houston Swap Meet. I will be preparing a "Markings" article in honor of Albert to be published in the April 2019 issue of The Antique Outboarder.

"It was the best of times." The Albert K. Snell Memorial Houston Swap Meet was successfully held from November 9th through 11th in spite of threatening weather. Please refer to my report appearing later in this issue.

"It was the worst of times." Although the weather on the weekend immediately prior to our 25th anniversary celebration was sunny and had 75 to 80 degree temperatures, the weather for the meet was mostly cold and wet. Temperatures fluctuated from the 45 to 60 degree range over the three day period and it rained lightly on Friday and Sunday.

The Albert K. Snell Memorial Houston Swap Meet - 25th Historical Year

When we speak of our annual Houston swap meet, the name to remember is Louis Rothermel. Although I was privy to the first gathering of a few members in 1993 by being invited to a barbecue dinner at Luther's BBQ in the Galleria area of Houston, the resulting annual swap meet was the brainchild of Louis Rothermel, and he held his first swap meet in November 1994. The meet has been successfully held at Louis' shop on Star Lane for 25 years now, and my only claim to fame is that I have been extremely fortunate to attend every one of the gatherings.

This meet was historic in my opinion for several reasons. Since I have been a member of AOMCI and its Texas Chapter, I believe the Houston swap meet is the longest running annual meet in our chapter's history. In addition, as mentioned on the front page, this event will be remembered as the Albert K. Snell Memorial Houston Swap Meet to honor our friend and long-time member, Albert Snell of Jasper, Texas, who passed away on November 8, 2018. Last, but not least, Adam Finn presented our host with an Honorary Life Membership Certificate that was awarded to Louis by the Executive Council of AOMCI in October 2018. This was a very special event.

Like past Houston swap meets, this one started on Friday and lasted through Sunday (November 9th through 11th). Otherwise, the weather tried to make a mess of this meet. With repeated poor weather forecasts being received earlier in the week immediately prior to the meet, we started some preparations early to beat the bad weather.

I offer thanks to several individuals who brought items earlier in the week. John Slator made at

least two trips bringing items from his home in New Ulm, Texas and then returning home for the next load. John Plato also came early in the week to bring motors for display, and John Graf brought his fantastic trailer which contains one of the most impressive Mercury outboard collections that anyone has ever seen. Louis had contacted me about some parts that were to be donated by Bob Johnson of Reynold's Marine, Inc. over in Baytown, Texas. As a result, I made a trip to Baytown before the rains came and picked up the parts and delivered them to the meet site. In addition, I brought along some tables and chairs to prepare the smorgasbord of NOS parts to be available to our participants.

For one of the few times I can recall in Houston history, the local weather forecasters actually guessed correctly. Friday's temperatures were relatively cold at 45 to 50 degrees and it rained for most of the day. It was not a driving flooding rain, just a continuous light irritating rain. Where



we would have ordinarily had people coming in throughout the day bringing in things to swap and trade, the majority of the items had already made it to the meet earlier in the week. So the few that braved the crummy weather on Friday already had their items unloaded and on display in the vacant space next to Louis' shop. Ironically, the rain stopped around 4:00PM and the sun actually made a brief appearance. Approximately 13 individuals came on Friday and took part in the morning donuts and coffee, and then fantastic hamburgers from Pete's Finer Meats for lunch.

Saturday was a different story. Temperatures were in the 50 to 60 degree range and the skies remained overcast; however, it only sprinkled very lightly once or twice and remained mostly dry for the majority of the day. We had a much larger turnout than expected in spite of poor weather forecasts with some additional people bringing in motors for display and/or for sale. The usual coffee and donuts awaited everyone's arrival as the excitement began to take hold.



NOS parts donated by Reynold's Marine, Inc., plus some remaining parts donated by Royce Strickland from previous years, were displayed on top and below a long line of tables inside the vacant space next to Louis' usual workshop. A box marked as "Honor System Collection Box" was placed on the tables with instructions for anyone to take whatever they desired and to insert whatever amount the buyers thought the parts were worth to them. At the conclusion of the meet, enough funds had been collected to purchase two year memberships in AOMCI and its Texas Chapter for Bob Johnson of Reynold's Marine, Inc. and Royce Strickland. Thank you, Gentlemen, for your outstanding support!

In our last newsletter, I had challenged members to bring one or two of their special outboards for display only. Obviously, the recently vacated space next to Louis' workshop was a great plus to those displaying motors because these special outboards could be protected inside the building.





It appeared that one of the favorite motors at this meet was Greg Ganz's Evinrude Ducktwin 3HP outboard. In addition, Greg brought his 3HP 1958 Johnson JW model outboard which is also in excellent condition and seemed to attract a lot of attention as well. If you look at the photo to the right, you will see a very special visitor checking out Greg's outboard and giving it his "Presidential Seal of Approval".



At the conclusion of the meeting, Adam presented Louis with the official anniversary cake from the Texas Chapter.

Following the luncheon on Saturday, many of the members began to pack up early and started their trips back home. At last count, there were

Mike and Jim's project for this day was to figure out how to remove the prop shaft from the lower unit and to make a new shaft on Louis' lathe. If I am lucky, the work may be completed by next year's swap meet.

There were individuals that attended on all three days and we closed at 6:00PM daily as planned. For those of you who did not make the trip this year, never fear. Louis has mentioned that if everything goes well in 2019, he plans to have a 26th annual Houston swap meet.

I do want to point out something unusual that occurred on Saturday. I overheard someone asking about membership into the AOMCI and Texas Chapter, so I offered to take the dues and make sure that they got to the appropriate membership administrators. When all was said and done. I went home and proceeded to set up new memberships or renewals for nine individuals. I would like to thank the following people for committing to two-year memberships in our main organization and its Texas Chapter. The next time you see Darren Baird, Brian Delaney, Brian Hays, Bob Johnson, Brenden Macaluso, Bobby Marek, John Martin, Patricia Nichols, and Royce Strickland (Royce was extended to the year 2022), please welcome them to our club with open arms and do whatever you can do to assist them in furthering their outboard motor projects. I cannot remember a meet where we signed up this many folks at one time. We offer our sincere thanks to these people and hope to see them all at some of our upcoming meets.

I also would like to remind some of our Texas Chapter members that their memberships could be expiring at the end of January 2019. Please remember that our chapter is a subsidiary of the Antique Outboard Motor Club, Inc. and it is not appropriate for us to take membership dues into our chapter account if you are not a member of the AOMCI. Notices will be sent out by the end of the year for those who are due for renewal on January 31st. We hope you all decide to renew!

Last Minute Revival of The Annual Fall Wet Meet at Heart of Texas Lake Resort

On October 16, 2018, the Tuesday before our scheduled annual fall wet meet in the Lake LBJ area, there was a monstrous rain storm. The following photo shows what was happening at the Llano River bridge in Kingsland that night.



Things did not improve from that point as water kept rising to an unbelievable height. As can be seen below, the bridge just begins to crumble apart under extreme pressure from the currents.



Then large chunks of the bridge started tumbling down the Llano River along with boats, docks, trees, and debris of all types. Is there any doubt as to why the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) closed all of the lakes and rivers in that general area for an undetermined period of time?



The devastation of the bridge was unbelievable, especially when you realize that we used to drive across that particular bridge in order to take a right turn into the Longhorn Resort before it was sold over a year ago. Unbelievably, the water level was well above the top of the launch ramp area where we used to launch our boats.



Those people who live across the Llano River from Kingsland were only a few minutes from their neighborhood stores in town. They are now having to drive for miles to get to stores in Marble Falls and/or Llano rather than driving twice that distance to get back to their usual Kingsland stores by traveling the long way around.

Texas Chapter officers were hopeful that we could reschedule the meet for later in the year, but we had no way of knowing what to expect from the weather or the debris in the water. We changed our prior meet date from the weekend of October 19th through 21st to November 30th through December 2nd with the hopes that we may get lucky. What were the chances of good weather during the first weekend in December? We were not really certain that the LCRA would reopen the lakes and rivers by then; however, our luck improved and the areas were reopened the week before our newly scheduled dates.

Louis Rothermel and I had decided early in the year that we were going to the fall meet, and as a result, we set out early on Friday to attend the rescheduled event. My son, Mike, and his three children, Emma, Tommy, and Charlie, decided to caravan with us, so they followed us up to the Heart of Texas Resort.


I have to admit, there were some stumbling blocks as we made our way to Burnet, Texas. First of all, the weather which had been predicted to be decent was looking suspicious with some clouds overhead and a few misty sprinkles as we traveled down the highway. Then we got stuck in a traffic jam on I-10 near Sealy as the contractors thought it would be a good idea to squeeze two feeder lanes and three major highway lanes into a single lane crossing over the Brazos River. An hour later, we actually got back up to speed and it appeared that the rest of our trip would go well. That did not happen because there was some type of severe accident between La Grange and Smithville and our side of the highway was closed entirely. If not for the superior mapping

ability of my son's cell phone, we probably would have remained at the end of a line of parked cars for several hours as we watched an emergency helicopter land at the collision sight ahead of us. Mike and his family took the lead driving down a secluded single-lane country road and after winding down an unbelievably long and very brushy backroad path, we actually came out just before Smithville. That only cost us another hour, but we may have been delayed longer back at the site of the collision had we decided not to attempt the trip around it.

Of course, we had to stop at our usual barbecue restaurant in Spicewood and we filled up on the cuisine provided by Opie's Bar-B-Q. We had a feast of pork ribs, beef brisket, sausage, and even some chicken for the kids. We also bought a few side orders including Opie's legendary "butter beans". The kids slept the rest of the way to the camp and we finally arrived at around 7:00PM. Considering that we left Houston a little after 11:00AM, it appears that our usual five hour trip took us almost eight hours this time.

We noticed something unusual happening as we got closer to the resort. The clouds appeared to be breaking up around the Marble Falls area and were pretty much gone by the time we got to the Heart of Texas Lake Resort. There was a brisk wind, but it was not overly cold. It was amazing when you consider that this was the last day of November.

As is customary, some of our members are early birds and they arrived on Thursday, but most of the participants arrived throughout the day on Friday and even a few came early on Saturday morning. After spending a few hours visiting with others at the camp, we decided to retire early. We joined a few others on Saturday morning for breakfast at the "Crazy Gals" diner in Kingsland. It was obvious that the area was recovering from




Jim Norbeck assisting Mike Oncken at the ramp.




Steve Seale hitting the throttle on his little racer originally owned by Albert Snell. (To accentuate a point, check out the sky behind him. Beautiful!!)




Chip Rathbun scooting by the resort area being followed by Louis Rothermel. Be careful, Chip, Louis has a "hot cam" in that storm boat motor!
